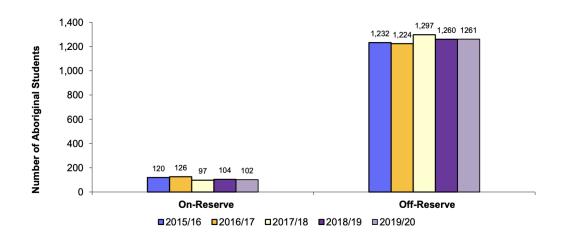

- A. Dr Martin Brokenleg (2009) asserts that nothing happens until belonging happens. When a crisis happens, the first priority is to stabilize the youth with support, create a connection
- B. The biggest predictor from grade three is their "Sense of Belonging" whether a student will succeed in school (Dr. J. Katz, 2016)
- C. Certain kinds of parental involvement pay handsome dividends: higher student achievement, higher aspirations, better attendance, improved classrooms and school climate and more positive relationships between parents and teachers (Ziegler, 1987)

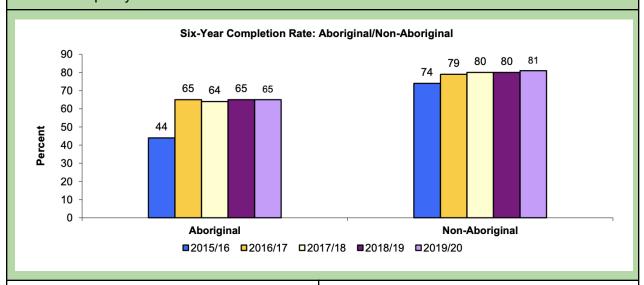

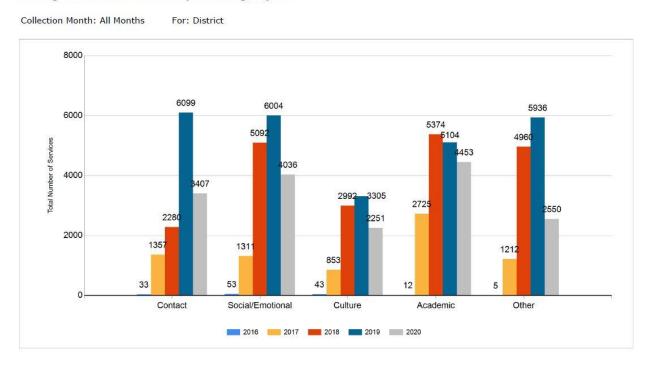

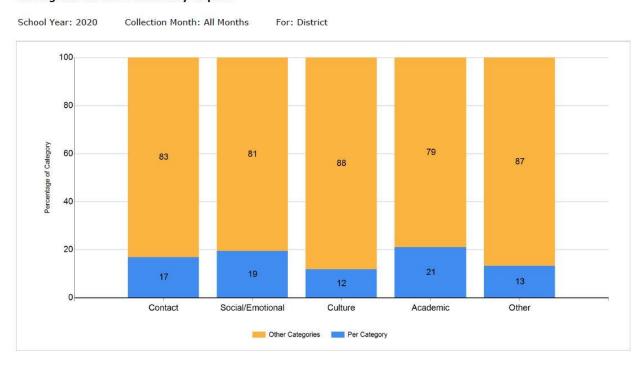

# Framework for Enhancing Student Learning Buick Creek School 2021-2025

#### **Buick Creek School is:**

- A place where students feel safe and welcome and are actively engaged in academic as well as personal learning.
- A technology-rich educational community where students, teachers, support staff and parents work together to learn and grow.
- An inclusive school that encourages and celebrates personal responsibility for both learning and social interaction within the school community and beyond.

#### Introduction

Buick Creek School is a small rural school located 73km north of Fort St. John. Current enrollment is approximately 24 students from Kindergarten to Grade 9. The school utilizes a blended learning model whereby instruction is delivered by teachers from the Key Learning Centre under the support of two teachers working onsite for a total of 4 days per week; Fridays are reserved for home-learning under the blended model with teachers

diversity more seamlessly in mixed grade classes from K-9. The current state of the Buick Creek Blended model is the result of several years of development from the initial parent-volunteer traditional distributed learning to the current teacher-directed, EA supported model. Significant input from the community has helped ensure that this model better functions within the cadence of the rural/agricultural needs of the area.

providing work or online support to students at a distance. The onsite teachers are supported by 3 EA's working with students at all grade levels. Educational technology plays a much more significant role in student learning under the Buick Creek Blended model and it is leveraged to provide consistency in learning environments as students transition between home learning and inschool learning. Hardware such as iPads. PC laptops, classroom smart-displays and stylustablets coupled with software such as Mathletics, JollyPhonics, RazKids, Gizmos and others are the tools teachers and students leverage to make learning not only possible but successful in this unique delivery model. The use of this technology allows for KLC to support the student's academic

#### **Framework Development Process**

Administration, teachers, support staff, students and community members make up the stakeholders at Buick Creek School. Through consultation with stakeholders, goals are set and methods of gathering evidence are established. Formal annual review occurs in September each year as well as informal review opportunities throughout the year as stakeholders meet. Framework presentations to the School Board occur annually.

#### What the Evidence Told Us



Project Based Learning is an integral part the program.

Program ran officially for the first time during the 2020/2021 school year. Significant effort was put forward in the logistic development of the program as well as in the establishment and growth of a sense of community. During the course of the year informal assessment by also indicated teachers consistent improvement in reading, writing, mathematic capacity and engagement, however, it was noted that much work was still needed to ensure continued improvement in the future. An improved focus on data-gathering in support of educational goals will be practiced as the program matures. Focused participation in Provincial Assessment and District Assessment programs in Literacy Numeracy are a priority for this and coming years.

The KLC/Buick Creek School alliance began in 2019/2020 as a parent-directed Distributed Learning delivery model. The parents at Buick Creek elected to hire two of the parents to act as support for the program and the students worked together from the Buick Creek Arena under their direction with instruction and assessment being provided by the Key Learning Centre in a modified Distributed Delivery style. Anecdotally parents reported substantial growth in both literacy and numeracy across all grade levels. More importantly, perhaps, were the reports that their students liked going to school and were excited about learning! The Buick Creek Blended

# A focused multi-partner approach to measurably improve reading participation and literacy levels.

#### **Goal 1: Increase Literacy Rates**

#### Objective 1.1: Improve student scores on district literacy assessments

#### **Key Strategies**

- Use SD73 Reading Assessment tool for Grades 4 – 9
- Utilize RAD and benchmarks for Kindergarten – Grade 3
- Practice buddy-reading, silent reading and in-class reading strategies
- Utilize 'Fast For Word' and 'Words Their Way' programs for identified students in need

#### **Targets**

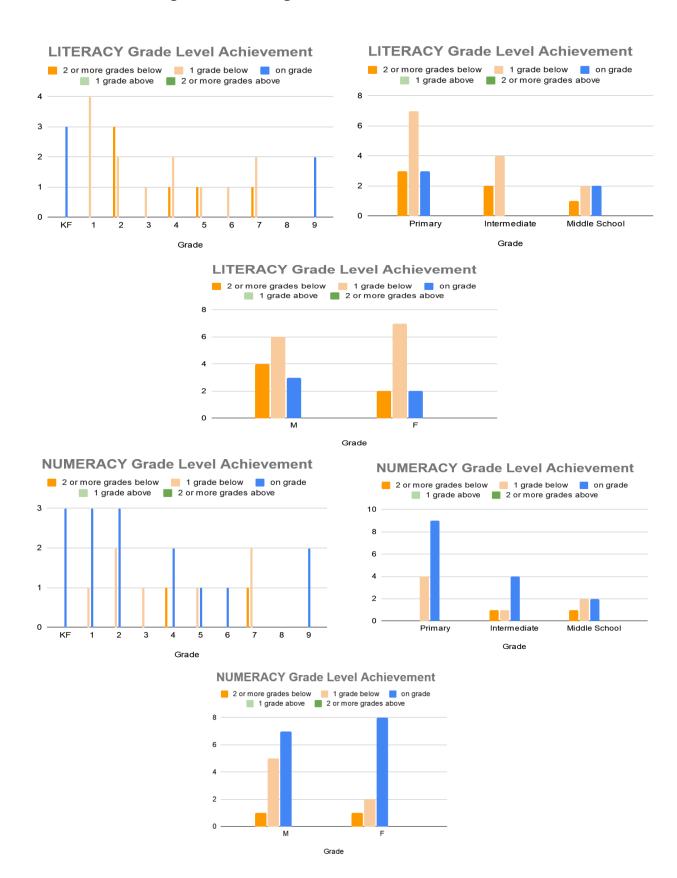
- All students will improve literacy scores by at least one grade level by June 2022.
- 'Shoot for the Moon' all students are reading at or above grade level by June 2023.

#### **Targeted Resources**

- Part-time engagement of EA support specifically targeted towards assisting teachers with ongoing literacy assessment (informal) and literacy improvement strategies.
- Purchase of more digital literacy focused reading content to support iPad and Laptop reading programs both during the 'in-school' and 'at-home' phases of the Blended Learning Program.











#### Objective 1.2: Increase student and parent engagement in homereading activities

#### **Key Strategies**

- Communicate regularly with parents to celebrate the reading-at-home program
- Measure and assess home-reading
- Celebrate successes in class
- Formalize a tracking tool to measure home reading participation
- Tracking (Back and Forth) form indicating Title read, # of pages read, time spent reading, summary of read content and parent signature/comment.
- Teacher accounting based upon parent reporting and student comprehension assessment of home reading as well as assessment of reading in class.

#### **Targets**

- Parents and students will actively participate in the 'at-home' reading program 5
  of 7 days per week as measured by the tracking tool within 6 months of program
  initiation.
- Ongoing participation levels to remain at 5 of 7 days or greater.

#### **Targeted Resources**

 Enrichment of the library at Buick Creek School to include a larger quantity of 'student interest' reading content for all grade levels in both digital and print format.

## **Goal 2:** Improve Student Engagement in the Blended Learning Portion of the Buick Creek School Program

Objective 2.1: Improve student activity levels during the 'at-home' phase of the Blended Learning Program

#### **Key Strategies**

- Restructure student practice / extension assignments to be done between Friday and Sunday.
  - Paper and/or digital to accommodate internet availability.
- Encourage and check for home reading taking place during the 'at-home' phase.
- Utilize Project Based Learning (PBL) strategies to make the 'at-home' activities more relevant to the student's home experience.

#### **Targets**

- Student check-in during the Friday 'at-home' phase improves to 80%.
- Completion of assigned practice work done during the 'at-home' phase improves to 80%

Objective 2.2: Improve parent involvement at all stages of the Blended Learning Program

#### **Key Strategies**

- The use of Google Classroom (and paper agendas) as a communication tool between the classroom and the parent.
  - Require parent signature or email for assignment completion verification.
- Restructure assignment / extension activities to include parent involvement.
  - Address home-life scenarios within the assignments and activities.

#### **Targets**

 Bidirectional parent communication (email, telephone or agenda) to occur a minimum of twice weekly.





Objective 2.3: Improved student & parent comfort levels with the educational technology used at school.

#### **Key Strategies**

- As COVID regulations permit parents will be invited to after school sessions to demonstrate and instruct the use and support of the technology used as a part of the Blended Learning Program.
- Virtual sessions offered to parents during after school sessions via KLC.

#### **Targets**

4 parent instructional sessions per year (Sept, Oct, Nov and Feb)

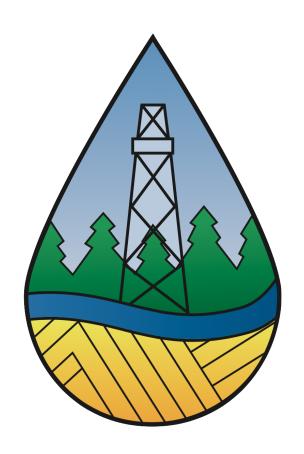

#### Registration

User groups are required to complete and submit the **3rd Party User Agreement** to the school office for approval. Please see the form below(pages 6-9).

Application approval will be based on the following criteria:

- Organizational level of club
- Prior access to school
- Youth focus
- Community focus

#### **Health & Safety Requirements**

- Must adhere to all applicable Provincial Health Orders
- Must follow COVID-19 sport specific guidelines
- Must have a safety plan as required by Northern Health Authority
- Must keep track of all participants, in the event contract tracing is needed
- Must verify Vaccination Passports where required (22 years and older at this time)
- Review SD60 Communicable Disease Prevention Plan
- Users must wear masks where required as per the Provincial Health Order
- Locker rooms/change rooms: It is encouraged to come dressed and prepared for your activity. Change rooms must be sanitized after use.
- Failure to comply with all the required guidelines directed by the Provincial Health Officer will result in cancellation of user group bookings

#### **Daily Health Check**

- All individuals must perform the "daily health check" prior to accessing the building
- Anyone displaying symptoms of illness are not permitted on site and are encouraged to seek medical advice
- Anyone who falls ill while on site will be asked to immediately exit the location.

#### See Appendix A for Daily Health Check

#### **Hand Hygiene**

- All individuals are required to sanitize their hands upon entering the building.
- Frequent hand washing and sanitizing is encouraged.

#### **Respiratory Etiquette**

- Cough and sneeze into their elbow, sleeve, or a tissue.
- Throw away used tissues and immediately perform hand hygiene
- Refrain from touching their eyes, nose, or mouth with unwashed hands
- Refrain from sharing any food, drinks, unwashed utensils, cigarettes, or vaping devices



#### **Conditions of Usage**

- Do not arrive more than 15 minutes prior to your session. Allowing this time will ensure a "buffer" between groups therefore providing enough time to sanitize. All users must promptly leave the building once their scheduled time is done.
- All users / participants must remain respectful of the on-site staff.
- Users must remain in the designated area of use. Access to the rest of the school is prohibited.
- Remind parents that the school is not responsible for unattended children.
- There is no smoking or liquor on school grounds
- Remove all outside footwear
- Keep food out of designated area of use
- Each user group must have an designated on-site supervisor at all times
- Failure to comply with all requirements contained within this agreement will result in cancellation of user group bookings
- Confirm all participants understand the above requirements

#### **Parents and Spectators/Capacity**

 Spectators will not be permitted for the 2021/22 usage year due to the constantly changing Provincial Health Orders and the additional stress of policing and enforcing the Orders

#### **Keys and Security**

- Users must pay \$100 key deposit, which will be reimbursed when the users bring back their keys by the date specified
  - If the keys are not returned by the specified date, it is understood that the school will keep the deposit
  - o If the keys are not returned, the group will not be able to apply for school access in the future, as this will result in a rekeying of the entire school
- Keys can be picked up at the school office during regular school hours.
- Keys are expected to be returned, as they are the property of the school. (This will also apply to all School District employees and teachers who apply for the usage of the facilities).

The alarm system must be turned on after the use of space on the weekend. Contact after-hours call centre at (250) 785-6781 with any concerns.

#### **Designated Entrance**

• Enter the building through the designated entrance

#### **Building Access**

- Restricted to the entrance area and designated area of use
- All other access in the building is strictly prohibited
- Users will be required to use designated washroom only



#### **Facility Cleaning and Disinfecting**

All user groups are required to pay a \$100 cleaning deposit at the time of booking.

All user groups must clean and disinfect the following areas of use::

- a. Doors / handles
- b. Light switches
- c. Benches
- d. Used School District equipment
- e. Designated bathrooms
- f. The floor must be swept

Disinfection bottles and cleaning supplies are provided in the designated area of use for user groups.

The required cleaning and disinfecting stated above must be completed after each use of the facilities. Should the required cleaning not be completed, it is understood that the school will keep the cleaning deposit, and may result in the group not having school access in the future

#### First Aid

Each group is required to bring their own First Aid kit to each session.

#### **Equipment Use**

Equipment, if necessary, will be arranged with the Administrator. Only on-site supervisors are permitted in the equipment room. Used equipment must be disinfected. Users are encouraged to bring their own equipment.

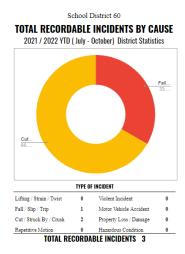


#### **Facilities**
